Take Action Online

Take Action Offline

- Contact your U.S. Representatives and Senators to let them know you want their support. Call, write or - better yet – meet in person in their local office. Check for tips on our *Contact Your Legislator* guide.
- Submit a letter-to-the-editor or opinion piece to your local paper. Refer to our samples & templates.
- Meet with your local newspaper's editorial board. Give them our Kid-Safe packet and refer them to EWG with technical questions.
- Ask your Governor and Attorney General to support Kid-Safe. They can urge your Congressional Delegation to support Kid-Safe.
- Host a house party. It's an excellent way to spread the word and engage your family and friends in something you care about.
- Get your children involved! They can send our kids' letter to their U.S. Representative and Senators.
- Lobby with us in Congress. A constituent visit to your representatives' DC offices is a powerful statement.
